Victorian jurisdictional derogation (advanced metering infrastructure roll out)

Thank you for the opportunity to provide a submission on the Victorian Government's proposed jurisdictional derogation under the National Electricity Rules (Rules) concerning the roll out of advanced metering infrastructure (AMI) in Victoria.

Role of the responsible person

Integral Energy supports the Victorian Government's proposal to provide exclusivity for local network service providers (distributors) to act as the responsible person in respect of the AMI meter roll out to small (less than 160 MWh per annum) customers. As stated in Integral Energy's submission to the Ministerial Council on Energy (MCE) dated 29 October 2007 in response to the Smart Metering and Direct Load Control Cost Benefit Analysis - Phase 1 Report, distributors have the ability to use existing infrastructure to deliver metering and communications services and to leverage economies of scope in relation to the proposed roll out. Mandating this role for local distributors would provide greater certainty as to the delivery and operational efficiencies that are key components of the AMI project.

Relationship with national approach

Integral Energy notes that the Victorian Government has, in the derogation request, indicated its support for the national mandate to roll out smart meters in areas where the benefits outweigh the costs, arrangements for which are currently being progressed by the MCE. Integral Energy also understands that the Victorian industry is at present undertaking the activities required to enable phase 1 of the local roll out to commence in order to meet the Victorian Government's objective of completing that roll out by the end of 2012.
